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MAYOR VILLARAIGOSA ANNOUNCES THE OPENING OF ALL 21 FAMILYSOURCE CENTERS

As unveiled in the Mayor's 2009 State of the City address, the Family Resource program is a part of the City's new approach to providing anti-poverty services to families in need

LOS ANGELES – Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa today announced the opening of all 21 FamilySource Centers, the City's revamped anti-poverty system. The 21 FamilySource Centers - 16 operated by community-based organizations and 5 operated by the City - are one-stop centers to connect people in need with existing anti-poverty, government-sponsored programs.

"We are going to better connect services to the people who need it the most with our 21 Family Source Centers located in our hardest-hit neighborhoods," Mayor Villaraigosa said. "At these Centers, people will be able to seek assistance for themselves and their families and benefit from programs at every level of government – and all on a single form."

In his 2009 State of the City address, Mayor Villaraigosa unveiled the FamilySource Center program as part of his new approach to providing anti-poverty services to Angelenos in need. Overall, the program hopes to increase the number of families applying for assistance to 50,000 annually. Each center was sited in the most impoverished areas of Los Angeles.

The two main goals for the program are increasing family income and increasing academic success. At the core of the FamilySource Center's strategy is the "One-e-App" system which allows families to fill out one application to apply for multiple anti-poverty programs provided by federal, state, county and city governments.

By using the One-e-App system, individuals can learn if they qualify for the programs such as: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF); Kaiser

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Permanente Child Health Plan; Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC); Supplemental Nutrition for Women, Infants and Children (WIC); Medicare Cost Sharing Program; CaliforniaKids (CalKids); Low Cost Auto Insurance Program; and California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE).

A main component of the FamilySource Centers is the competitive bid process that awards contracts to community organizations to run 16 of the 21 FamilySource Centers. Much like the strategy behind the Mayor's Gang Reduction zones, the competitive bid process not only ensures a level of transparency in the rewarding of contracts, but enforces a level of accountability by requiring operators to 1) use the One-e-App system; 2) provide extensive case management to at least 350 families at each Center (5,000 program wide); and 3) identify youth ages 16-24 who are out-of-school and out-of-work and re-connect them to high school, community college or job training programs.

The Family Source Centers will receive \$18 million in funding through the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The new FamilySource Centers program establishes an infrastructure for delivering coordinated, outcome-driven services to the most vulnerable city residents, and positions the City to pursue other resources to augment existing funding.

The 21st FamilySource Center opened on January 21, 2010.
